MISSION

The European Festivals Forest aims to lead the festival industry and cultural audiences in a collective climate action to mitigate the environmental impact of festivals through afforestation.

VISION

We will continue to work together with festivals and their audiences across the continent to nurture climate action towards net zero, to embed best practice in our sector, and to focus the activist potential of festivals and festival audiences to campaign for the culture and practice of environmental sustainability. CONTENT REPORT

2022

During our pilot year, audiences from six festivals together donated 2828 trees, laying the foundation for our afforestation efforts. The trees were planted in June and November 2023 at Tumastaðir in Iceland by our partner Skogræktin (now called Land og Skógur). After 2022, our two Belgian participants, Festival of Flanders Brussels and STROOM, decided to continue their green initiatives locally. Four participants of the pilot were keen to remain involved in EFF in 2023 as well: Festivaletteratura, Schiermonnikoog Festival, Remusica and Wonderfeel.

One of the key learnings from this pilot was the value proposition of $\in 2$ per tree, made

possible through our partnership with Skogræktin. Their expertise in afforestation, access to uncultivated land, and efficient seedling cultivation significantly reduced the cost per tree compared to other local plantation schemes in Europe. Moreover, the absence of squirrels in Iceland ensured optimal conditions for seedling growth, minimizing the risk of depletion.


2023

Building on the successes and learnings of 2022, the European Festivals Forest expanded its reach in 2023, welcoming thirteen new festivals and three touring companies into the fold. These additions, including Culturescapes, Noorderzon, Parade, Popronde, ECOS Festival, Reykjavík Arts Festival, Rewire, Usedomer Musik Festival and Weissenhorn Klassik plús, Brussels Jazz Orchestra, Flamengo Agency, and Fast Forward Classical, together with our four founding participants Festivaletteratura, Schiermonnikoog Festival, Remusica and Wonderfeel, contributed to the planting of another 6698 trees – about 2,5 hectares – in Iceland, scheduled for the 2024 spring season.

EARLY 2024

In January 2024, we were pleased to welcome Princeton University Press to EFF. In the first quarter of this year over 1,500 trees have already been donated, bringing our total (d.d. 1 May 2024) to 11,066 trees. On 7 June 2024, we will plant 8238 trees (6698 from 2023 and already 1540 from 2024), bringing our total forested area to over four hectares. We are very happy to cross the threshold of 10,000 trees in just over two years, symbolising the significant impact of our joint efforts in the fight against climate change.

COMMUNICATION

In **December 2022** we sent out our first newsletter to 104 recipients. In 2023 we sent out 5 digital newsletters to ultimately 433 recipients. On average, the newsletter is opened by around 60% with an average click rate of 13.
